- 3 The California DataQuest database defines the four-year "Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate" (ACGR) that it calculated from 2009-2010 through 2015-2016 as the "[n]umber of cohort members who earned a regular high school diploma by the end of year 4 in the cohort divided by the number of first-time grade 9 students in year 1 (starting cohort) plus students who transfer in, minus students who transfer out, emigrate, or die during school years 1, 2, 3, and 4."

- 4 Beginning in 2016-2017, the state of California changed how it calculates its four-year "Adjusted Cohort Graduation Rate" (ACGR), and cautions against comparing this new, modified, graduation rate with the graduation rates it calculated for prior years. Data for the new, modified, ACGR are available on the California Department of Education's (CDE) website. CDE defines the new, modified, ACGR as "the number of students who graduate from high school in four years with a regular high school diploma, divided by the number of students who form the adjusted cohort for the graduating class. The four-year cohort is based on the number of students who enter grade 9 for the first time adjusted by adding into the cohort any student who transfers in

later during grade 9 or during the next three years and subtracting any student from the cohort who transfers out, emigrates to another country, transfers to a prison or juvenile facility, or dies during that same period.”
